CURIOSITY

For Maths, we have been focusing on using bar models to find Fractions of Amounts. We worked out that 3 fifths of 25 is 15 using Marshmallows and Haribos. If we got the answer right, we were allowed to keep the sweets. Even better, the children are now able to work these amounts out in their heads!



During our Interoception lesson, we focused on the brain and head, as our body parts and looked at some of the words. This helped us understand, label and describe how our brain and head might feel for each activity.



We were all very excited to have reached our 100 tokens as a whole school reward system. As part of our reward, we watched Diary of a Wimpy Kid: Rodrick Rules on Thursday afternoon and really enjoyed getting our popcorn and milkshakes as treats.

In Art, we were learning about the artist India Flint and gathered plant materials such as leaves, flowers, and twigs. We really enjoyed using this to print our ideas and designs with either clay or paint on paper.



In our Science lesson, we were

exploring Jane Goodall's work with chimpanzees. We watched a short documentary, which shows how Goodall's research supported the protection of chimpanzees in their habitats. This helped us make the connections in our statements of what are facts or fiction.



It is wonderful to see all the students back in school this week. We had lots of fun in Movement Break and it was great to see everyone join in the games.



EXPLORER


This week has seen us working on our next character education - integrity.

We've been taking part in team games and played a human game of noughts and crosses and worked in teams to complete various maths challenges.



Damon also took our DT project to the next level and made an 'escape room' style box that Grant had to try incredibly hard to solve!














ROSETTA


In English, we have been continuing to investigate Shakespeare's "A Midsummer Night's Dream", looking at the characters, their traits and how they interact with each other in more detail.


Pioneer's attempts at the Fusion challenge this week has been to




Fusion Challenge
