

Lemurs: We have seen some lovely artwork, the children painted one side of a butterfly then pressed the paper together. The results were lovely. In Cooking we made chocolate mud cake with jelly worms. We went on a sensory walk and explored different materials such as bark, grass and flowers. we then collected all the things we found and used them to make a bug hotel.

Leopards: We have been thinking all about the mini beast of 'spiders!' Initially we saw some cautious children at the start of the week but by the end we all enjoyed our sensory poem using water sprays and wool to spin dewy webs and playing tickling games as if they are crawling up our legs. Ellis has had a particular super week remember lots of important facts about spiders and talking to lots of his friends and staff about what he has learnt.

Lions: We have enjoyed finding minibeasts this week out in the playground. Many of our Lions like to hold them and observe their movements. We have moved our focus on to minibeasts in Topic. Firstly we explored where they can be found. The pupils mostly enjoyed the water spray that signified ponds. Then we focused on caterpillars and butterflies. We moved in different ways to signify their life cycle.

Llamas: We have continued with our theme around mini beasts. In Topic we learnt about the life cycle of a butterfly. We explored colourful pasta caterpillars and made some beautiful footprint butterflies. In Maths we made caterpillars thinking about pattern and repeating patterns and used cubes to create our own and in literacy sequenced the main aspects of the story.

<u>Tigers:</u> We have learned about the Life cycle of a Butterfly and enjoyed the story 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar. In Maths we have looked at shapes and pattern and created symmetrical butterfly paintings. In PHSE the class have worked together to make a simple bottle Wormery and enjoyed collecting worms which we will observe over the week.

Saturn & Neptune: In Neptune English they have been watching 'creature comforts' clips and adding speech bubbles to the different characters. In Maths they have been working on their problem solving skills and have been working on tying laces, Lacey-Mae dressing dolls and folding sheets. In Geography they worked in teams to make table top maps of how to get from school to McDonald's. In Saturn they have finished off watching the DVD 'Esio Trot' and have worked on predicting what happened next when the DVD was paused when Mr Hoppy asked Mrs Silver to marry her and ordering pictures from the film and adding writing next to each picture. In Maths they have been working on fractions and Thomas, Brandon and Levi did amazing using the 'base 10' kit working out the different fractions. Both classes have been continuing their learning about the ocean with the focus on the sunlight zone. The focus of this week's lesson was learning about turtles and they enjoyed exploring 'The Great Barrier Reef' on google maps.

Venus: The children have enjoyed continuing to learn about pets and how to care for them. In PE the children have continued to develop their hockey skills through a series of passing, dribbling and shooting drills. Next week we hope to play a short game of hockey. Some other children explored passing the ball in different ways; throwing and rolling. They also loved throwing the balls into sensory trays and watching them splash. In PSHE we learnt about what games we might play at sleepovers and practised our turn taking. In Science we learnt about the life cycle of a penguin. Well done Venus!

Apollo: In Maths, the class have been working hard on missing numbers. By the end of the week, pupils were working independently with the use of part-whole diagrams. In Science, we continued to explore waves and the difference between

low and high tides and how the moon affects the tides. Max spent his dinnertime yesterday making new friends and shared his toy cars with them. He has scheduled another get together with his new friends for next week.

Kite: In English students looked at setting in Hound of the Baskervilles, especially Dartmoor. They looked at how settings can create mood and atmosphere. On Thursday students created a 'Dracula scene' at Whitby Abbey. The students were so engaged that this took all morning. There were some great scary character, including statues that come to life! In Maths students worked on addition and subtraction. In Science work continued on Seismic waves, including tsunamis and earthquakes. Art was all about creating art using everyday items such as toy cars, lego, scouring pads and many other items. It was great to see students experimenting to see what different effects they could achieve.

Owl: In Maths we have looked at multiplication, specifically in word problems, the class were able to work independently using resources to break down the problems. In English we looked at the settings in hound of the Baskervilles comparing day and night and adding to our horror word bank. In Science we looked at Tsunamis, making a fact file and creating houses for an experiment. in PSHE we looked at independence and camping, cooking ourselves a quick snack and making hot drinks for ourselves

Poseidon: In English this week we have been exploring our senses and learning how to describe the schools playing field by touch, smell, sight and sounds. In maths we have been learning how to crack codes using our addition and subtraction knowledge. In Science we have continued exploring energy waves and creating our own experiments to do this. In PSHE we have started to look at foods we like while on a picnic and in Art we have explored different textures and colours by learning how to create a copy of different textures by rubbing.

All pupils are expected in school from Monday 12th April.	The shielding period has now ended and all students are expected in school. If this is causing you any difficulties please contact the school.
Secondary aged pupils to wear masks	We encourage secondary aged pupils to wear face masks if they can taking into account their needs Please send in more than one mask so that this can be changed at suitable times during the day e.g. after eating.
Lateral flow tests for students.	Please make sure your child tests themselves or help them to take the test twice a week on a Monday morning (if possible and, if not Sunday night) and Thursday morning (if possible and, if not Wednesday night). If you think this may be difficult please contact us and we will discuss what will be best - including possible continued testing at school. This does not replace testing for those with symptoms. If you have symptoms you must self-isolate and go for a PCR test.
Lateral Flow tests for staff	Lateral flow tests will be available for staff
	a high temperature – this means the person feels hot to touch on their chest or back
Please remember not to send your child into school if they show any of the following symptoms	a new, continuous cough – this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if they usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
	a loss or change to sense of smell or taste – this means the person cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal
