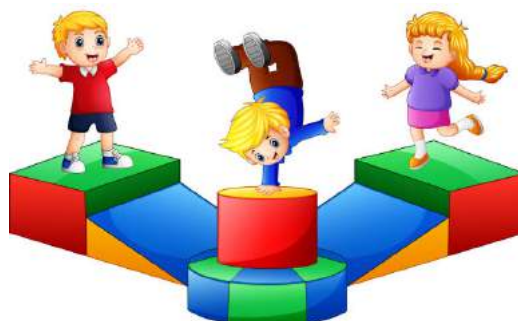

We've really enjoyed the weather this week - it's been absolutely glorious spending so much time outside.

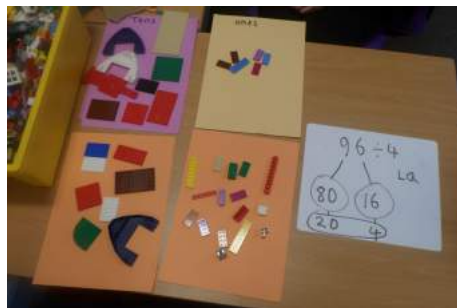

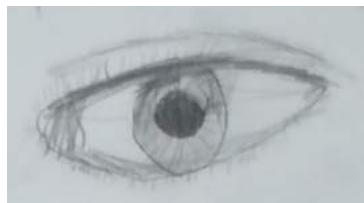
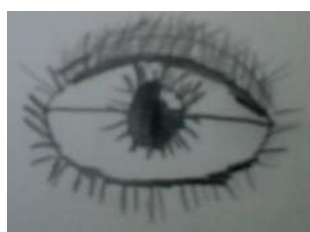
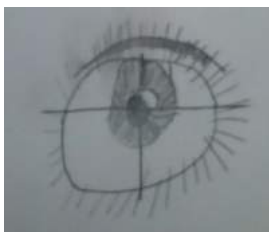
With the really warm weather, we have also been using the chalks more outside and Jacob created a great big yellow man using the centre circle of the basketball court as it's face!

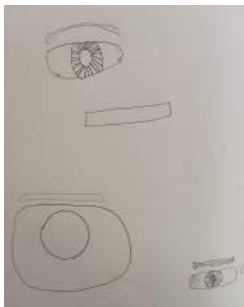
## PIONEER

In English this week, we have been continuing our arguing and persuading techniques, looking at how useful statistics and exaggeration can be to reinforce a point or to make something sound incredible! We have started to look at times when the students might need to persuade someone to get what they want (so be aware they might be asking for things and being more persuasive than usual!).

PE has been led by Josh this week again, setting up football drills and getting the students involved. He started with a warmup of "cups and saucers" - students have to turn over the cones and get as many facing up or down (depending what team they are on). He then created a circuit of various football activities (dribbling, free kicks and other skills) and even had the staff involved, giving them top tips to improve their skills.



We are making different types of bread in Cooking this term, this week was bread rolls. Unfortunately we didn't manage to get any pictures of the process. Again, we had loads of positive feedback from students; as well as, folks at home!



We have been drawing eyes in Art too, some students (along with Tom and Laura) were inspired by Rosetta class' efforts and we used theirs as examples in our lesson to show the different approaches to drawing them (lots of effort on one eye, or trying lots of different attempts, improved bit by bit).

## Trolling

“Trolling” online is usually done by an individual to spark an argument or to annoy. It falls into the same category as last week about feeling safe behind the computer and a feeling of anonymity.



With lockdowns happening around the world, people of all ages have not only needed an outlet for their frustrations, but also turned to sites or online social hangouts. This combination has no doubt led to an increasing number of arguments online.

It can be very difficult for young people to understand why some choose to write and say the things they do online, and it can be just as difficult to understand why we care so much about what strangers say too.

With trolls planting ideas designed to annoy or typing to vent their own frustrations, it can be dealt with in many ways. Most just scroll by and ignore it (but of course no-one sees these good examples) whereas others might bite - it only takes one for the troll to see that they have achieved what they wanted to. The ideal 3rd option is to get the comment reported and flagged / removed. This can take time and of course doesn't actually stop the problem itself.

It's a really difficult one to solve, and can have a real effect on mental health for both the troll and victims. On one side the troll needs validation and wants to have a voice, and be heard, and it can be really difficult for the target not to take things personally and can really bring people down.
