From our headteacher: It has been another busy week at school. The pupils were proud to showcase their work when we had visitors who spent time at each of the sites on Monday. There was a range of learning on display with pupils at the HAJC base exploring first aid and how to assess a situation to ensure that it was safe before helping someone. Kailon was more than happy to take on the role of the person who was unwell but contributed at the same time to the discussions about what needed to happen. The visitors had a roast chicken dinner at the Vocational Sixth Form where the pupils shared with them the experiences that they had of school. Tahlia shared that she was preparing to leave school and move on to college, hoping to go to the same college as her friend. Ruby shared how she had been at the different satellite bases and that she was enjoying being at the sixth form learning life skills such as taking part in shopping and cooking. Chloe talked about her work experience at Forever Savvy, the new skills that she has learnt and how some of the designs she has completed there could be used to make clothes. She also talked about her aspirations for the future and wanting increased independence.

The focused learning continued throughout the week with Tigers and Turtles engaging really well with free flow choosing from a range of learning opportunities which included work on phonics, mark making and reading. They also enjoyed their session in soft play on Thursday when Olivia, Aurora and Mia encouraged me to join in – the ball pool was a big hit although there were not many balls left in it by the end of the session! Tiffany-Mae really enjoyed the PE session where she was confident in climbing on to the equipment, balancing and jumping off. She listened well to instructions and waited until it was her turn to go. Tarell was working with Key Stage 1 as part of his Sports Leader qualification and he did a fantastic job of making sure that the equipment was safe and more importantly of encouraging and praising the pupils that he was working with.

Please keep the office updated with any dietary requirements for your child. School Meals can be paid for via Arbor.

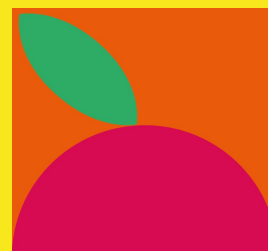

KS 2

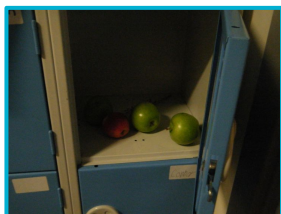
Earth: Great independence and communication during cookery!

Cleveland House: George achieving a distinction in his English speaking assessment.

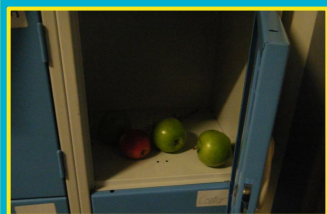
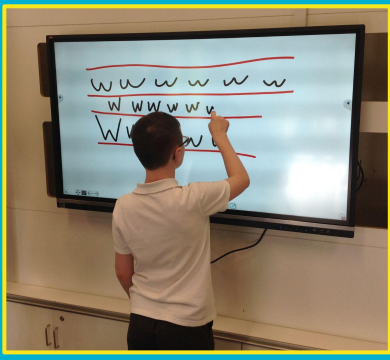
