In Maths, we have been using Base 10 and egg boxes to help us to understand that division means sharing into equal groups. We are hoping that this will help us to become super speedy when remembering our Times Tables!

POLAR

We had such a busy week in Polar and worked incredibly hard in our English sessions. We focused on a new book called Hurricane by David Weisner. We looked at the blurb, front cover and read the first page before predicting what would happen next.



Then we retrieved and summarised the story using story mapping boxes template and pictures to support us with our writing.


We also applied our knowledge of four different commas that can be used in sentences, to help us when we are going to be writing our own descriptive poetry.

EUROPA




This week we have been working on being good friends to each other, which has involved lots of paired or group work. We are getting really good at recognising who we can ask for help in our class.

In Maths, we have been working on fractions. We started our week by matching atypical representations of familiar fractions to their fraction form. The students really enjoyed the sensory experience of the tuff tray and were brilliant at recognising the different fraction representations.

Lennon and Jayden were very excited to work together to make "The Maths Dream Team". They have realised they make an excellent team and have enjoyed working together in other lessons too.

On Thursday, all of the students respectfully observed the two minute silence. Jayden was worried he wouldn't manage it, so he set himself a challenge with the timer to practise before 11am and was very proud of himself when he did the 2 minute silence with everybody in class. Throughout the day, the students worked on Remembrance themed tasks, including making a model of a Spitfire, a poppy wreath and writing a lovely poem together.



ODYSSEY



We've had lots of fun this week in Odyssey class. Monday was baking day and we all made bread. We practised our skills of kneading and shaping the dough and we had to decide when it was time to add more flour. We even made our own butter. We did this by shaking some double cream. The fat molecules all stuck together to make the butter. It was really good with a bit of salt added.



We have continued our topic of Richard III and investigated the mystery of the Princes in the tower. We were surprised to learn that the mystery has never really been solved, but we all had our

own suspicions about what might have happened to Richard's nephews.



We're enjoying working on A Christmas Carol and on Thursday we watched a bit of the movie to learn more about the character of Jacob Marley. The students worked really hard to use their powers of inference and we started to think about what his chains might represent.



We had a science morning on Wednesday and thinking about science in the news, we completed a sustainable energy project. We learned how to generate a watt of electricity

and made our own wind turbines. The challenge was to pick up a weight from the floor using a winch powered by the turbine. All the models worked brilliantly, but Damon's was the most successful in the end, picking up the most weight.



In Maths, we practised reading line charts to investigate our own electricity consumption.

Everybody is really enjoying our PE lessons and participation is always 100%. Jamie (Sports Coach) really challenged us with some circuit training this week.

Everybody worked very hard to keep going even when it got really difficult. Great determination Odyssey class!



APOLLO


On Friday last week, Apollo joined the other classes for the bonfire and had a great time roasting marshmallows, whittling sticks and making impressions of leaves.











In Maths, we are now looking at multiplying fractions, this (left) is Sol's work showing how fractions can be multiplied by whole numbers, shown on a number line.

In English, we have been looking at Victorian life for the rich and the poor to investigate the setting in which A Christmas Carol is set. This will help us to better understand the message that Charles Dickens is putting across and allow us to write well structured answers.

In DT, we looked at Hurricane Katrina and how people dealt with the disaster. We then created our "emergency grab bag" by choosing and justifying different objects that we would pack. It promoted some great discussions.

Finally, in Home Care we sorted and folded clothes, a few were confident already but now there is no excuse for any of them not to do it! Many thanks again for those that donated clothing and other items to help with this topic.

Online communication


On the 9th June 2021, Ofcom published their annual report about how people interact online. This highlights some of the main points relevant to children and parents.
