






WRITE UP

MOVING ON - POST 16 OPTIONS

TRAINEESHIPS



- ★ If your child is aged 16 to 24 and not quite ready to start an apprenticeship, they could consider a traineeship.
- ★ It is a programme that helps young people gain skills and includes work experience and study.
- ★ Traineeships are unpaid and usually last for 6 months or less.
- ★ Traineeships are designed to help young people who want to get an apprenticeship or job, but don't yet have the appropriate skills or experience.
- ★ Traineeships will include a substantial work placement and other opportunities to develop the skills an workplace experience than an employer would require.
- ★ Traineeships are aimed at young people between 16-14 years with or without an EHC Plan, who have qualifications below level 3.
- ★ The content of a traineeship may be tailored to the individual needs of the young person.
- ★ Traineeships may offer: work preparation training, job searching, CV writing, interview preparation, interpersonal skills, accredited qualifications such as employability or sector based qualifications, English and maths qualifications, a high quality work experience placement.
- ★ The goal of the Traineeship is to move the trainee into an apprenticeship on completion of their programme.
- ★ From 1 August 2023 the National traineeship programme will cease to exist and instead will be integrated into other 16-19 study programmes for young people. Individual providers may, however, decide to continue to offer traineeships themselves so you should check with your local college or training providers.
