












WRITE UP

MOVING ON - POST 16 OPTIONS

SUPPORTED INTERNSHIPS

- Open to young people aged 16-24 years with an EHC Plan
- ❖ A structured, work based programme typically around 70% of the time in the workplace
- An unpaid programme
- Lasts for at least 6 months
- A workplace training and study programme the aim is to enable the intern to take up paid employment at the end of the internship which could be with the same employer
- An opportunity for young people to achieve sustained, paid employment by equipping them with the skills they need for work through learning in the workplace
- The intern will be supported by an expert Job Coach support will taper off, if appropriate, as the intern becomes familiar with their role
- ❖ Job Coaches work with the employers and employees to increase their confidence in employing individuals with additional needs and helping them to create and support a diverse workforce.
- Supported interns are in full-time education and their supported internship work placements are part of their course
- The supported internship should contribute to the long-term career goals of the young person and match their capabilities
- Alongside their time with the employer, supported interns complete a personalised study programme delivered by the school, college or training provider, which includes the chance to study for relevant qualifications, if appropriate, and English and maths at an appropriate level, whilst meeting their needs and providing progression and stretch
- The aims of the internship: support young people to develop skills valued by employers, enable them to demonstrate their value in the workplace, enable them to develop confidence in their own abilities to perform successfully at work
- There are no entry or completion requirements for supported internships
- On completion of a supported internship, young people could move on to traineeships and apprenticeships.
