


#### **WEEKLY WRITE UP**







#### **CNC MACHINIST/OPERATOR JOB ROLE**

- Make precision parts for the engineering and manufacturing industries
- <u>Activities</u>: programme the CNC machine tool with data form technical drawings, work out the most
  efficient order to carry out machining tasks, choose the right tools for each stage and operate the
  machine, set the cutting speeds and tolerance levels, check work meets quality and technical standards
  and maintain equipment
- Qualifications: college courses 2 or less GCSEs at grades 3 to 1, or equivalent, for a level 1 course, 2 or more GCSEs at grades 9 to 3, or equivalent, for a level 2 course; Apprenticeship Engineering Operative level 2 intermediate or Machining Technician level 3 advanced for an intermediate apprenticeship you will need some GCSEs, usually English and Maths, or equivalent, for an advanced apprenticeship you will need 5 GCSEs, or equivalent, including English and maths
- <u>Salary</u>: £20,000 to £35,000 pa average
- Hours: typically 42-44 per week could include evenings and weekends or shifts
